Descriptif de l'épreuve

Lisez attentivement les instructions suivantes avant de commencer l'épreuve : l'épreuve d'Anglais a pour objectif d'évaluer le niveau de grammaire, de vocabulaire et d'orthographe du candidat, ainsi que son aptitude à la compréhension de la langue écrite.



En 2023, l'épreuve d'anglais passe d'une durée de 45 minutes à une durée d'1 heure. Le nombre de questions dans la partie « grammaire et vocabulaire » sera donc désormais de 65 QCM avec un format différent dont les modalités vont seront précisées sur le site : concours-acces.com

L'épreuve comporte 2 parties :

1^{re} partie: grammaire et vocabulaire (40 questions)

Dans cette partie, le candidat doit montrer sa richesse dans la langue à travers ses connaissances linguistiques.

2^e partie: 2 textes de compréhension (10 questions)

Cette partie comporte 2 textes extraits d'articles de presse portant sur l'actualité internationale, des faits de société, des analyses d'événements.

L'évaluation de la compréhension de la langue écrite porte aussi bien sur le sens explicite du texte que sur sa signification profonde ou implicite.

Conseils

• **Pour bien préparer la première partie** de cette épreuve, il faut bien connaître sa grammaire.

Les points suivants peuvent être testés: tous les temps et aspects (formes et usages), les verbes modaux, les formes passives et conditionnelles, les formes interrogatives et négatives, le fonctionnement des adjectifs, adverbes, prépositions, noms (pluriels, composés) et pronoms, les articles, les verbes irréguliers, réguliers et ceux à particule, les mots de liaison et articulateurs logiques entre deux phrases ainsi que toutes les fonctions (comment suggérer, comparer, conseiller, donner son avis, etc.).

Vous pouvez également être testé sur les nombreux « faux amis » existants entre le français et l'anglais.

Vous n'avez que 45 minutes pour toute l'épreuve ; il est donc conseillé de ne passer que 25 minutes sur la partie grammaire. Vous avez ainsi moins d'une minute par question et bien connaître sa grammaire devient un réel avantage.

• **Pour la deuxième partie**, il faut développer une méthode de lecture efficace car vous ne disposez que de 10 minutes par texte.

Il est conseillé de commencer par lire les questions et ensuite de lire très rapidement le texte pour identifier les sections utiles. Il faut ensuite lire attentivement les sections où se trouvent les réponses afin de déterminer rapidement quelles phrases sont vraies selon le texte.

Il est évident que plus vous lisez d'articles de presse, plus vous écoutez la radio ou les bulletins d'informations en anglais, plus l'accès à ce type de lexique sera facile et, de ce fait, la compréhension des textes rapide.

Lewis Hamilton backs meat-free burger chain.

Formula One racing driver Lewis Hamilton is among the investors in a new restaurant group that aims to be the world's first plantbased burger chain.

Neat Burger will open its first outlet near London's Regent Street next week and plans to expand to 14 franchises globally over the next two years. It will target all diners, not just non-meat eaters.

Mr Hamilton, who became a vegan in 2017, has invested an undisclosed amount in the venture, which is headed by hospitality company '*The Cream Group*' and has also been backed by Italian investor Tommaso Chiabra.

"As someone who follows a plant-based diet, I believe we need a healthier high street option that tastes amazing, but also offers something exciting to those who want to be meat-free every now and again," Mr. Hamilton said.

The burgers will be made using a meat substitute from the US-based company 'Beyond Meat', whose shares have soared from \$25 at its float in May to about \$165 now, giving it a market value of roughly \$10bn. Neat Burger will serve a variety of eco-friendly food and drink products, including dairy-free milkshakes and Jaden Smith's 'Just Water'.

The launch comes at a torrid time for the UK casual dining sector but the group aims to benefit from the rising popularity of nonmeat diets and meat alternative products.

Between 2014 and 2018, the number of vegans in the UK quadrupled and now one in four UK evening meals contain no meat or fish, according to research by 'Kantar Worldpanel'. In the US, annual sales of plant-based meat have hit \$800m and some analysts,

including at Barclays, have predicted the global market for plant-based meat could be worth as much as \$100bn in 15 years.

Concern about the environmental impact of meat, especially among younger consumers, alongside long-standing worries about health and animal welfare, have propelled the rise.

Mr. Chiabra said the meat industry was the biggest contributor to greenhouse emissions, adding: "Neat Burger aims to disrupt the non-sustainable food industry and become a force for good."

Where the money is really made at Amazon.

Andy Jassy runs Amazon Web Services (AWS), perhaps the most important part of the Amazon empire. AWS sells data storage and processing for companies that don't want the headache of running their own IT infrastructure. It's a business known as cloud computing and it has only been around 15 years. Its rapid expansion means AWS supplied 70% of Amazon's profits in its most recent quarter. Despite that success, the business is facing some real tests – not least fierce competition from Microsoft.

A big blow hit in October, when the US government awarded a juicy \$10bn contract from the Department of Defence (DoD) to Microsoft. Amazon's AWS had been expected to win the Joint Enterprise Infrastructure (JEDI) project. It is challenging the decision, saying there had been interference from the White House. In a document made public in December, AWS explained why it was protesting against the JEDI contract award. "The question is whether the President of the United States should be allowed to use the budget of DoD to pursue his own personal and political ends," the filing stated. "DoD's substantial and pervasive errors are highly dubious, and impossible to separate from the president's repeatedly expressed determination to, in the words of the president himself, 'screw Amazon'.

Speaking to the BBC, Mr Jassy said the decision was illogical, as Amazon had "the best possible technology infrastructure platform" and it was a "very dangerous" precedent if government was not going to base decisions on "objective valuations". However, things are unlikely to improve for Amazon in the future as President Trump has made his dislike of Amazon clear. In part that's because Amazon founder Jeff Bezos also controls the Washington Post newspaper, which the president considers hostile towards him.

Amazon is also the subject of a number of investigations into whether it has been acting in an anti-competitive way. In early December, a Bloomberg report suggested that the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) had broadened its scrutiny of Amazon beyond its e-commerce operations to include AWS. The report suggested that the FTC was investigating whether AWS was discriminating against companies that also work with other cloud providers, and prioritising those that work with AWS exclusively. Mr Jassy, however, would not be drawn on this.

Cloud companies store data in their own data centres, and Amazon is no different; the issue is that these data centres are energy hungry, consuming about 2% of electricity worldwide, and "contributing to 0.3% of global carbon emissions", Jassy goes on to say. Amazon's climate pledge includes a promise that its entire business will run on 80% renewable energy by 2024, and 100% renewable energy by 2030, with it pledging to become net carbon neutral by 2040. "The environment is an obviously critical issue for the future of our planet and Amazon has a very aggressive set of goals that I'm not sure you've seen others take," Mr Jassy claimed.
